Course Aims

This course provides an introduction to the study of East Asia, the macroregion that is commonly understood to consist of Greater China, Korea, and Japan. Our focus for this semester will be the emergence of a coherent cultural zone from the beginnings to the early modern period (ending around 1644), with particular attention to the question of empire formation and the ideologies underlying the idea of empire in East Asia. No prior knowledge of the languages and histories of East Asia is assumed, though a willingness to learn romanization of East Asian names, places, and terms is required.

Except for the very first class meeting, you should complete each set of readings before the class meeting and come prepared to discuss the readings during class.

It is expected that you, as students of the University of Virginia, will adhere to both the letter and spirit of the Honor Code. All violations will be reported to the Honor Committee.
