Enterprise Database Systems

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Course pre-requisites: None. Some experience using databases or database driven applications preferred.

Course description: Students learn and apply the fundamentals of relational database modeling and database management systems technology in the development of business information systems. This course encompasses entity/relationship diagrams, relational theory, normalization, integrity constraints, the Structured Query Language (SQL), and physical and logical design. Students will also be exposed to core concepts associated with data warehousing and business intelligence.

Learning Outcomes: Analyze user requirements to design a fully normalized relational database solution; Create a physical database design from a logical database design; Develop moderately complex SQL queries from a physical database design; Test queries using realistic data and current database technologies; Utilize database design concepts to design and create a functional relational database; Demonstrate an understanding of the issues associated with database recovery, security, performance and concurrency; Demonstrate an understanding of the processes involved in creating a data warehouse; Describe the issues organizations face when developing a data warehouse solution. Understand various vendor software packages for DB and BI/BA.

Course Methodology: The instructional methods used in this course will be:

- engagements in live online sessions, online discussion forums, weekly quizzes and assignments;
- posting and answering questions to be discussed in live online sessions;
- reading assigned course book chapters and additional readings;
- reviewing PowerPoint presentations for chapter revisions.

Course Delivery: This is an online (web-based) course with live online meetings. For this semester, meetings will be held on Wednesdays 7:00PM - 10:00 PM.

Students may also be required to view pre-recorded sessions in preparation for classes, in which case class times may vary.

Honor Code at UVa

Founded in 1842, the Honor System is one of the University's most cherished institutions. Based on the principle that University students want to be trusted, the Honor System helps create and strengthen a school-wide community of trust. Students at the University make a commitment not to lie, cheat or steal within Charlottesville, Albemarle County, or where they represent themselves as University students in order to gain the trust of others. Because they have make this commitment, students are trusted by peers, faculty members, administrators, and community residents alike. Students conduct themselves with integrity and are presumed honorable until proven otherwise. Students are recruited and trained by the Honor Committee to serve as advisors and to provide counsel. Students investigate Honor allegations, assist and support accused students through the Honor process, and work with accused students in their defense at trial. Honor jury panels are similarly comprised entirely of students. While anyone may initiate Honor proceedings, the process is

administered entirely by students. The vitality of the Honor System depends upon the willingness of students to uphold the high standards set by their peers. When a student is formally accused of an Honor offense following investigation, that student may elect to either (1) leave the University, without requesting a trial (in which case that student will be deemed to have admitted guilt, whether or not such an admission is expressly made), or (2) request an Honor trial.

Any student found guilty of an Honor offense, or deemed to have admitted guilt after having left without requesting a trial, will be permanently dismissed from the University. The notation "enrollment discontinued" will be placed on the student's transcript, without specific reference to the Honor proceedings. In the case of a student found guilty of an Honor offense following graduation, or deemed to have admitted guilt without requesting a trial after graduation, the General Faculty of the University may undertake proceedings to revoke that student's degree. The rules of the Honor System apply to any person who was a University student at the time an alleged Honor offense was committed, so long as a case is initiated within two years thereafter. Students who enroll at the University benefit from the freedom and security provided by the Honor System; every student must agree to live by and support the spirit of honor.

Applicants who are not prepared to embrace this freedom and accept this responsibility should not apply for admission.
